

My name is Simos and I am one of the marble craftsmen of the Acropolis. I come from the Greek island of Tinos, an island of the Cyclades where the art of marble sculpting has a long history and is part of daily life on the island. Lots of people with different trades and professions work on the big project of restoring the monuments of the Acropolis but most of us are marble craftsmen.





More than 2500 years ago, in other words during the classical period, the four most glorious monuments of the Acropolis, the Parthenon, the Propylaia, the Erechtheion and the Temple of Athena Nike were built.

Those buildings were constructed from white Pentelic marble, a beautiful but very difficult material to work with.

Experienced stonemasons and sculptors worked to cut and carve it and created these unique buildings.

Over the thousands of years
the monuments of the Acropolis
suffered damages from a number of events
such as war, fire, earthquakes
as well as the effects of serious air pollution.
To deal with all those problems
the country of Greece set up a special organization
called the Acropolis Restoration Service.

But now, let us return to the exhibition...

Every day at the worksite we carve marble, we join together the fragments and we create supplements, marble "copies" of the missing pieces from the monuments.

There are many happy moments in our day but there is also a lot of hard work.

I would like to tell you what we feel about our work. Six simple words say it all and you can find them in the exhibition...



Our work is very demanding, physically and mentally. You need to be very careful, strong and patient to undertake such an important work.


Find this picture in the exhibition. What are the workers transporting?



Often we need to defy danger, making the monuments the first priority, above all.


Look carefully at the photographs: what difficulties do you think these people face daily in their work?


Look at the huge architectural members presented in the exhibition and think about how demanding their transport and placing in position on the monuments must be!

Maintaining the tradition of the Tinian marble craftsmanship is considered so important that in 2015 it was included in the UNESCO Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity.
